Matthew 5:13-20 NAS

Jesus Explains Good Works and the Law!

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: The teaching on the next three Sundays will be in Matthew chapter 5 as follows:

- 13-20: Jesus explains good works and the law!
- 21-37: Jesus fully explains three of the commandments!
- 38-48: Jesus tells us how to love our enemies!

But WHO is Jesus talking to? Going back to the beginning of chapter 5, it says that Jesus' "disciples came to Him. ² And... He began to teach them..." Disciples are "learners," they are like apprentices who are in the process of becoming journeymen! So they are learning, then putting that learning into practice. "True learning means application to good deeds, genuinely following in the spirit of Christ." (TDNT, One Volume, 555) Paul wrote these words to Titus regarding believers: "And let our people also learn to engage in good deeds...that they may not be unfruitful." (Titus 3:14 NAS)

Therefore, let us, as believers, hear and do what Jesus says.

1. Good Works:

a. <u>Be salt</u>: ¹³ "You are the salt of the earth…"
Since salt prevents rapid decay of food, so
believers are called to prevent the rapid decay of
the sinful world. <u>But how</u>? To live every day and
in every way as followers of Jesus! What's

- included? *Trusting Jesus, *denying ourselves, *knowing the Bible, and *doing what it says!
- b. Remain salty: "...but if the salt has become tasteless, how will it be made salty again? It is good for nothing anymore, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot by men." // For salt to lose its saltiness, it must undergo a chemical process – a definite change! Dr. Kretzmann wrote: "Christians that have lost their distinctive properties have ceased to influence their surroundings for good, [they] have also lost their discipleship [in other words, they are no longer listening to the H.S. who was prompting them to follow Jesus].... So the Christians that have ceased to apply themselves to their business of acting as a moral power in the world will *[be*] thrown out and trampled underfoot, thus will] partake of the judgment of the world." (NT 1:25) (also see John 15:6)
- c. <u>Be light</u>: ¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ Nor [Not even] do *men* light a lamp, and put it under the peck-measure, but on the lampstand; and it gives light to all who are in the house." // Jesus was preaching on a mountain, so His listeners right then could have seen many other cities which were built on higher elevations; such cities could not be hidden! In the same way, those who know Jesus as Savior will not be hidden from others! We are light; our purpose is to shine!
- d. <u>Keep reflecting the light</u>: ¹⁶ **Let your light shine** before men in such a way that they may see your

good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven." // So the light, which disciples shine, is in the form of good works. Dr. Kreztmann wrote: "All men that come in contact with their works shall be forced to draw conclusions as to the power that inspires them." (NT 1:26) As people witness what we do, may they glorify our Father!

2. The Law:

- a. What Jesus did with the Law: ¹⁷ "Do not think that I came to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I did not come to abolish, but to fulfill." // The Son of God came to do what no mere human could do; He came to perfectly keep every OT Law. Since Adam's failure brought sin to all, Jesus success has provided righteousness for all.
- b. Jesus' thorough fulfillment of the law: 18 "For [introducing an explanation] truly I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or stroke shall pass away from the Law, until all is accomplished." // Jesus, who is God in the flesh, fulfilled every aspect of the Law including the smallest details! Then wanting us to know that the benefits of His work extend all the way forward Jesus used two phrases which point to the end of time. Therefore, being confident in Him alone, let us always have much peace and great joy in His finished work!

- c. Our relationship with the law: ¹⁹ "Whoever then annuls one of the least of these commandments, and so teaches others, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever keeps and teaches them, he shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven." // So what are "these commandments" Jesus spoke of? Lenski gave this answer: They include "all that God asks of us as disciples, in particular also repentance (3:2; 4:17) and faith in the Messiah, and then, of course, also newness of life." (210) Now consider this: The person who annuls one of the least and teaches others will be called least, so what about the person who annuls/cancels out even more! Therefore, let us be serious in our ◆study, ◆living, and ◆teaching of God's Word!
- d. Our keeping of the law cannot save us: 20 "For I say to you, that unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you shall not enter the kingdom of heaven." // The scribes and Pharisees were all about keeping the rules; they thought: If we do well, we will make ourselves righteous yet they were deceived! Since no one can earn heaven, God is offering everyone the gift of heaven through Jesus!

Conclusion: Now, having been made righteous through Jesus, let us be spiritual salt and light in this corrupt and dark world! And all God's people said: Amen!
