## How Did the 3<sup>rd</sup> OT Feast of <u>Firstfruits</u> Point Ahead to Jesus' First Coming?

Fourth Wednesday of Lent, April 2, 2014 at 11 AM & 7 PM Wednesday Services during Lent at 11 & 7; Meals at 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Our focus today is on the third of the spring feasts which is called Firstfruits:

- It was a one-day feast, just like Passover (Unleavened Bread, the second feast, was a seven-day feast).
- It began at sundown on Saturday, thus from a Jewish perspective, it began on the day after the Sabbath, which is Sunday, the day Jesus' was raised!
- It began the 50-day countdown to the Feast of Pentecost, which was the fourth and final spring feast.
- It <u>looked back</u> to **God's temporal provision** through the barley harvest – God provides physical needs, like food for our bodies!
- It <u>pointed ahead</u> to **God's eternal provision** through Jesus –
   God provides eternal needs, like resurrection from the dead!
- 1. Recognize and Give Thanks for God's Temporal Blessings:
  Firstfruits, also known by its Hebrew name Reishit (Re-SHEET), was an offering of "the first ripe sheaf (firstfruits) of barley to the Lord as an act of dedicating the harvest to him."

  In a similar way, we should always recognize God's blessing of food, then, before consuming it, let us give Him thanks! In Leviticus 23, following the instructions for

  \*Sabbath days, \*the Passover, and \*Unleavened Bread, we come to this instruction about Firstfruits: 

  The LORD said

to Moses, <sup>10</sup> "Speak to the Israelites and say to them: 'When you enter the land I am going to give you and you reap its harvest, bring to the priest a sheaf [the firstfruits] of the first grain you harvest. <sup>11</sup> He is to wave the sheaf before the LORD so it will be accepted on your behalf; the priest is to wave it on the day after the Sabbath. <sup>12</sup> On the day you wave the sheaf, you must sacrifice as a burnt offering to the LORD a lamb a year old without defect, <sup>13</sup> together with its grain offering of two-tenths of an ephah of fine flour mixed with oil--an offering made to the LORD by fire, a pleasing aroma--and its drink offering of a quarter of a hin of wine. <sup>14</sup> You must not eat any bread, or roasted or new grain, until the very day you bring this offering to your God. This is to be a lasting ordinance for the generations to come, wherever you live.'" (Lev 23 NIV)

- a. Why "wave the sheaf before the LORD"? It was a way to acknowledge and thank the LORD for the barley He had provided. Do you pray before you eat? Our bodies need food and the LORD generously provides, so we should consistently give Him thanks!
- b. What is "the day after the Sabbath"? Sunday, the day Jesus rose from the dead! Thus the connection between Firstfruits and Easter!
- c. Why "a lamb a year old without defect"? I can't say for sure, but such a description definitely reminds us of the Passover lambs, which pointed ahead to the Ultimate Lamb of God our Savior!
- d. Why "bring this offering" before eating? Again, to acknowledge and thank the Giver! Maybe we could say: As giving the tithe FIRST frees us to use the remaining 90%, so waving the sheaf FIRST freed the people to gladly consume God's blessing!
- e. <u>Do we celebrate Firstfruits as "a lasting ordinance"</u>? Yes! *Easter Sunday is our Firstfruits celebration!*

Even more than that, on Easter, which includes our celebration of the Lord's Supper, we are actually celebrating Passover, Unleavened Bread, and Firstfruits!

- Believe and Receive God's Eternal Blessings: These are some connections between the ◆barley harvest, ◆Jesus, and ◆us being raised back to life:
  - a. <u>Firstfruits had three phases of activity</u>: Marking, gathering, and presenting. <u>Marking</u> identified the first mature barley; <u>gathering</u> was the binding of the sheaf; and <u>presenting</u> was waving the sheaf before the Lord.<sup>2</sup> Now, <u>think about Jesus</u>: †He was <u>marked</u> by the religious leaders <u>they decided to kill Him</u> (<u>John 11:53</u>); †He was <u>gathered</u> by the religious leaders <u>they arrested Him</u> (<u>Mark 14:44</u>); †He was <u>presented</u> by Pilate <u>he handed Jesus over to be crucified</u> (<u>Mark 15:15</u>).
  - b. Physical death is NOT the end:
    - i. <u>Jesus</u>: <sup>20</sup> "But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the <u>firstfruits</u> of those who have fallen asleep [died]. <sup>21</sup> For since death came through a man [Adam], the resurrection of the dead comes also through a man [Jesus, the God-Man]. <sup>22</sup> For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive. <sup>23</sup> But each in his own turn: Christ, the <u>firstfruits</u>; then, when he comes [Jesus' second coming], those who belong to him." (1Co 15:20-23 NIV)
    - ii. <u>Us</u>: God "chose to give us [spiritual] birth through the word of truth, that we might be a <u>kind of firstfruits</u> of all he created." (James

1:18 NIV) Firstfruits points *especially* to our physical resurrection, but we are a "kind of firstfruits" in connection with our *spiritual resurrection* – from dead in sin to alive in Christ. Also, as the offering of the firstfruits made the rest of the barley crop kosher or acceptable, *so Jesus*, the Ultimate Firstfruit, *makes us acceptable in God's sight!* 

- 3. Jesus and Holy Week: A probable scenario (see the handout):
  - a. <u>Thursday</u>: The Passover lambs were killed at 3:00 in the afternoon!
  - b. <u>Friday—Passover</u> (which began at sundown on Thursday): Jesus ate the Passover meal with His disciples and instituted the Lord's Supper; then He was arrested, tried, condemned, and crucified; then, after receiving all sins and all punishment, He laid down His life and was buried!
  - c. Saturday—Unleavened Bread: Jesus rested!
  - d. <u>Sunday—Firstfruits</u>: Jesus was raised!

Conclusion: So, even though we don't identify our festivals as Passover, Unleavened Bread, and Firstfruits, we do celebrate those festivals. In the OT those festivals pointed to Jesus' first coming; now, in the NT, we rejoice in our Savior who \*has come, \*finished His saving work, and \*set us free from sin and death! And all God's people said: Amen!
