## Malachi 3:13-18 ESV

## **Do You Fear the LORD?**

<u>Services</u>: Sunday, Nov. 20 at 8:00 & 10:45 + Monday, Nov. 21 at 7 PM <u>Church Year</u>: Last Sunday of the Church Year – 2016

Introduction: Dear friends: Do you fear heights or spiders? Such fears are common! Do you fear the LORD (thus, God the Father)? That fear is uncommon. But isn't that foolish? Think about this: <u>The LORD</u> who **\** is almighty, **\** provides all of our needs, and **\** can save us or condemn us, <u>is NOT feared</u>, while heights and spiders are feared. That is NOT good!

Before we go any further, let's understand that <u>fear can be</u> <u>defined in two ways</u>: (1) to have a reverential [respectful] awe [admiration] of God **or** (2) to be afraid.<sup>1</sup> Our focus today is on the *first* definition; we will discover from Malachi chapter 3 that <u>all who belong to the LORD</u> **also** <u>fear the LORD</u>.

Just before today's text, the LORD told the people that they were robbing from Him. The Bible teaches that the tithe, *the first 10%*, belongs to the LORD [Lev. 27:30]; so those who held *part of it* back were robbers. Then the LORD called the people to repent *and promised to richly bless those who did repent*. <u>What happened</u>? Those who feared the LORD *began to tithe*, while those who **did not** *fear Him* **did not** *change*.

Now we pick up with Malachi 3:13; the LORD was speaking to the people in Israel – *the descendants of those who returned from Babylon to rebuild the temple*. Some of them feared the LORD, *but others did not*; **today, let us learn the importance of fearing Him**; then, *if necessary*, <u>LET US REPENT</u>!

- Some Spoke Hard Against the LORD: <sup>13</sup> "Your words have been hard against me, says the LORD. But you say, 'How have we spoken against you?' // These upcoming words, in vv. 14-15, "are the complaints of the sceptics. The faithful [those who fear the LORD] refuse to be moved by these arguments..."<sup>2</sup>
  - a. <sup>14</sup> You [skeptics] have said, 'It is vain [empty] to serve God. What is the profit of our keeping his charge [thus, of doing what He wants] or of walking as in mourning [thus, in repentance] before the LORD of hosts? // The LORD is talking to people who tried to earn His favor by \*serving Him and \*avoiding sin; they did such things with the expectation that the LORD would reward them. So, when the reward did not come, they said that such things were worthless<sup>®</sup>. But such thinking is flawed! This, instead, is true: God calls us to \*see our sins, \*be sorry, and \*receive Jesus; then, in response, we desire to serve Him and live according to His Word! We don't serve to earn, but we serve out of gratitude!
  - b. <sup>15</sup> And now we call the arrogant blessed.
    Evildoers not only prosper but they put God to the test and they escape.''' // Even though unbelievers think the arrogant and evil will succeed, they will finally be overcome!

## 2. Some Fear the LORD:

a. <sup>16a</sup> Then those who feared the LORD spoke with one another. // Maybe they also read <u>Psalm 73</u>; <u>here are some selections</u>: ...my feet had almost

stumbled, my steps had nearly slipped.<sup>3</sup> For I was envious of the arrogant when I saw the prosperity of the wicked....<sup>5</sup> They are not in trouble as others are...<sup>6</sup> Therefore pride is their necklace...<sup>8</sup> They scoff and speak with malice... <sup>9</sup> They set their mouths against the heavens... <sup>12</sup> Behold, these are the wicked; always at ease, they increase in riches. <sup>13</sup> All in vain have I kept my heart clean and washed my hands in innocence. <sup>14</sup> For all the day long I have been stricken and rebuked every morning....<sup>16</sup> But when I thought how to understand this, it seemed to me a wearisome task. <sup>17</sup> until I went into the sanctuary of God; then I discerned their end. <sup>18</sup> Truly you set them in slippery places; you make them fall to ruin. <sup>19</sup> How they are destroyed in a moment... (ESV) The wicked seem to prosper now, **but**, without repentance, *they* will end up in eternal torment!

b. <sup>16b</sup> The LORD paid attention and heard them, and a <u>book of remembrance</u> was written before him of those who feared the LORD and esteemed [respected, honored] his name. // In ancient times, kings had books which included the names of their subjects; about 1,000 years before Malachi, Moses said to the LORD – in connection with the golden calf incident, "please forgive their sin--but if not, then blot me out of the book you have written" (Ex. 32:32 NIV). The Bible also identifies who will enter the new Jerusalem: "...only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life" (Rev. 21:27 ESV). Here in Malachi, only those who feared the LORD were included in the book!

- c. <sup>17</sup> "They shall be mine, says the LORD of hosts, in <u>the day</u> when I make up my treasured possession, and I will spare them as a man spares his son who serves him. // So "the day" refers to Jesus' return; right now, <u>the wicked</u> seem to be winners and <u>the righteous seem to</u> <u>be losers</u>, but Jesus' return will reveal the truth. Regarding the wicked, Jesus will say: "...these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life" (Matt. 25:46 NAS).
- d. <sup>18</sup> Then once more you shall see the distinction between the righteous and the wicked [lawless], between one who serves God and one who does not serve him." // Now the distinction is blurred, but clarification is coming! For all who are repentant, they are saved! Then, from today's sermon, we learned some of what characterizes such people: They \$fear the LORD, \$give the LORD what belongs to Him, and \$serve the LORD with no expectation of reward! Dr. Kretzmann wrote this warning, "The time of grace is still at hand [that is good news], but [unbelievers] and scoffers will do well not to delay repentance" (OT2:724).

Conclusion: Let us pray: Dear Father, for all who know Jesus, may that show in our lives; and for all others, please lead them to true repentance! And all God's people said: **Amen!** 

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
