Betrayal and Arrest A Young Man Flees

Based on the Booklet Days 28-29

Text: Mark 14:42-52 NAS-95

Lenten Wednesdays: Services 11 & 7; Meals 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: We are still on **The Holy Week Journey!** This is sermon **10 of 14**. We have preached through 23 of the 40 days; notice the BIG days:

- Palm Sunday 2 days.
- Holy Monday 2 days.
- Holy Tuesday <u>18 days</u>, 17 different events!
- Holy Wednesday and Holy Thursday 1 day.
- Good Friday 15 days (4 days so far, 11 more to go)!

As we journey with Jesus toward His cross, let us remember:

- Who He is the Son of God in the flesh of Mary!
- What He did took away the sin of the world!
- Why He did it to open the one way to heaven!

In this sermon, Jesus will permit Himself to be arrested, which is part of His work to "...remove the iniquity of that land in one day" (Zechariah 3:9).

Let's setup Day 28:

- In the upper room, somewhere in Jerusalem, Jesus has
 *washed His disciples' feet, *eaten the Passover meal,
 *instituted the Lord's Supper, and *taught His disciples many important things.
- Jesus and His disciples minus Judas are in the Garden of Gethsemane and it's late in the evening – maybe 11 pm.
- Jesus has just triple-checked with His Father about the possibility of a Plan B – to see if God the Father had another way of saving the world.
- Now, having been fortified through prayer and being ready to go forward with perfect obedience, we continue our text with Mark 14:42.

Day 28 (Sa, 3/16) — Betrayal and Arrest of Jesus: 14:42 [Jesus said to His disciples:] "Get up, let us be going; behold, the one who betrays Me is at hand!" ⁴³ Immediately while He was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, came up accompanied by a crowd with swords and clubs, who were from the chief priests and the scribes and the elders.

- Jesus' betrayer: Late on Holy Tuesday Judas entered into an agreement with the Jewish leaders to betray Jesus into their hands. Then, during the Passover meal, Jesus announced that one of them would betray Him. Now, aware that <u>Judas</u> and <u>many others</u> were arriving in Gethsemane, Jesus announced their arrival.
- A crowd: Those who came *were many, *were armed, and *were from the Jewish leaders. The Romans did not get involved until Friday morning – after Jesus had

been put on trial three times: ⊕before Annas, ⊕before Caiaphas, and ⊕before the Sanhedrin.

⁴⁴ Now he who was betraying [Jesus] had given them a signal, saying, "Whomever I kiss, He is the one; seize Him and lead Him away under guard." ⁴⁵ After coming, Judas immediately went to Him, saying, "Rabbi!" and kissed Him. ⁴⁶ They laid hands on Him and seized Him. // Judas gave Jesus the kiss of death, yet Jesus did not refuse – He was perfectly obedient for our eternal benefit!

- ⁴⁷ But one of those who stood by [that is, Peter (John 18:10)] drew his sword, and struck the slave of the high priest and cut off his ear. // Peter's sword or dagger (μάχαιραν) could be described as a large knife, a curved weapon, used for close combat, killing, and cutting up (BW, Friberg). Peter may have intended to kill the slave but missed.
- ⁴⁸ And Jesus said to them, "Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest Me, as *you would* against a robber?
 ⁴⁹ Every day I was with you in the temple teaching, and you did not seize Me; but *this has taken place* to fulfill the Scriptures." ⁵⁰ And they all left Him and fled.
 - The Jewish leader problem: Fear! We learned in Mark 11:32 that the Jewish leaders "were afraid of the people," so they were afraid to lay hands on Jesus when He was among the people.
 - The disciple problem: Fear, which means to "be afraid of (someone or something) as likely to be dangerous, painful, or threatening." Jesus had spoken about His impending arrest and death on three previous occasions (Mark 8:31-33, 9:30-32, 10:32-34). It's normal and natural that His disciples feared for their own lives!

Day 29 (Mo, 3/18) – A Young Man Flees: 14:51 A young man was following Him, wearing *nothing but* a linen sheet over *his* naked *body*; and they seized him. ⁵² But he pulled free of the linen sheet and escaped naked.

- Who was with Jesus? Officially the eleven remaining disciples were with Him, but a "young man was following Him" and maybe others – like Joseph and Matthias (Acts 2:21-23).
- Who was the "young man"? He was probably Mark, the writer of the Gospel According to Mark. He was not an apostle, but probably received much of his information from Peter.
- Some Mark and Peter connections:
 - Peter is the first and last disciple in Mark who is named (1:16; 16:7).
 - Peter is mentioned more than any other disciple in Mark.
 - Peter appears in the most important scenes in Mark (1:16-20; 8:27-30; 9:2-8; 14:32-42; 16:7).
 - Of the four gospels, Mark has the highest percentage of references to boats, the Sea of Galilee, and fishing.
 - With the healing of Peter's mother-in-law (1:29-31), Mark has some more personal details.¹
