Are We Honoring Jesus as Lord – Part 6: Luke 13:1-9 ESV

## Do Not Be Deceived: Repentant Ones are Fruitful Ones!

Introduction: Dear friends: When *hell-bound rascals* are transformed into *heaven-bound saints*, that radical change will also be accompanied by *the fruits of repentance*!

In <u>the first part</u> of today's sermon, Jesus is going to set our focus on **the need for everyone to repent**; then, in <u>the</u> <u>second part</u>, Jesus is going to show us that **all repentant ones will bear the fruits of repentance**.

- 1. Jesus Calls Everyone to Repent:
  - a. The slain Galileans: The first tragic event!
    - i. <sup>1</sup> There were some present at that very time who told [Jesus] about <u>the Galileans</u> whose blood Pilate had mingled with <u>their sacrifices</u>. // <u>What happened</u>? When animals were being killed for sacrifice, some Galileans were also killed – so the Temple of God was polluted with human blood!
    - <sup>2</sup> And [Jesus] answered them, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans, because they suffered in [that] way? <sup>3</sup> No,

I tell you; but <u>unless you repent, you will</u> <u>all likewise perish</u>. // So, repentance is important!

- iii. How do you view the suffering of others? Dr. Kretzmann wrote: "The suffering of the world is the result of sin. In the case of the unbelievers the suffering is nothing but punishment, with a view, however, of leading them to repentance. In the case of believers, suffering of every kind is chastisement [discipline] at the hands of the Father, who punishes in time that we may be spared in eternity" (NT 1:339).
- b. The great collapse: The second tragic event!
  - i. <sup>4</sup> Or those eighteen on whom the tower in Siloam fell and killed them: // What happened? We don't know the details, but it was certainly a heartbreaking death; none planned to die, and yet they did!
  - ii. [Then those present were asked by Jesus:] do you think that [those 18] were worse offenders than all the others who lived in Jerusalem? <sup>5</sup> No, I tell you; but <u>unless you</u> <u>repent, you will all likewise perish</u>." // <u>So,</u> <u>what is repentance</u>? It is a change of heart, attitude, and action! The BIG repentance is from hell-bound rascal to heaven-bound saint; then, what follows, is <u>a life of repentance</u>!
    - 1. Heart God works that change!

- Attitude That change comes from the heart!
- 3. Action God guides and empowers new actions that honor Him!
- Repentance Will Bear Fruit: <sup>6</sup> And [Jesus] told this parable: Keep in mind that a parable is a *physical story* with a *spiritual meaning*:
  - a. "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came seeking fruit on it and found none." // Think about it: God the Father called Abraham and his descendants > to be His own,
    > to be righteous through the coming Messiah, and > to bear the fruit of repentance by honoring Him in their lives.
  - b. <sup>7</sup> "And [the vineyard owner] said to the vinedresser, 'Look, for three years now I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and I find none. Cut it down. Why should it use up the ground?" // Imagine purchasing, planting, and caring for a fruit-bearing tree; then, after enough years went by, what would you think? *It should be bearing fruit!* What would you do if there was no fruit? Be even more patient, or cut it down!
  - c. <sup>8</sup> "And [the vinedresser] answered him, 'Sir, let it alone this year also, until I dig around it and put on manure. <sup>9</sup> Then if it should bear fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."" // As the descendants of Abraham were richly blessed, so we are richly blessed. But as we learned in today's epistle reading, "with

most of them God was not pleased" (1Co 10:5 ESV). Rather than bearing the fruits of repentance, they were idol-worshiping, sexually immoral, complainers! So, from converted hearts and with much gratitude, let us bear fruit:

- John told the religious leaders who said they were repentant, but had no fruit: "<u>Bear fruit in keeping with repentance</u>" (Mt 3:8 ESV).
- Paul rightly taught "that [the Gentiles] should <u>repent</u> and <u>turn to God</u>, <u>performing deeds in keeping with their</u> <u>repentance</u>" (Acts 26:20 ESV).
- iii. Converted people have the Holy Spirit; <u>the</u> <u>"fruit of the Spirit is</u> love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (Gal 5:22-23 NAS). So let us bear God-honoring fruit!

**Conclusion:** Dr. Kretzmann made these comments on on the parable of the fig tree: "There is a lesson here for all times, for God deals with all men in a similar way. His justice is tempered with patience; He waits long before He condemns.... But finally the most loving patience must come to an end and justice be carried out" (NT 1:340).

<u>Let us pray</u>: Dear Jesus, *for all who know You*, move us to gladly bear fruit, and, *for all who do not know You*, be merciful and convert them! In Your name we pray. Amen!
