Series – Part 10: How to Live as a Christian:

Be Truthful with God's Word! Faith without Works Is Dead! James 2:14-17 NAS

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ, <u>are you physically alive</u>? <u>How do you know</u>? You might answer by saying: I'm talking / I'm breathing / my heart is beating! If you thought of similar answers, you were giving tangible evidence!

Today, *in James chapter 2*, we are being called to see the *necessary* connection between faith and works. Martin Luther wrote: "We are saved by faith alone, *but the faith that saves is never alone.*"¹ In other words: As physical life involves breathing, *so faith in Jesus involves works*. Breathing doesn't make us alive, *but it is vital for all who are alive;* so our works do not make us Christians, *but they are vital for all who are Christians!*

As we continue in James, the LSB includes this note: "To this point, faith has been viewed positively (1:3, 6; 2:1, 5). [Now,] In 2:14–26, James uses "someone" else's definition of faith, which separates faith or belief in God from faithful living (v 18). [We will discover next week that] Even demons have

that kind of "faith" (v 19).... Faith [is] usually used to mean trust, but <u>here</u> James means <u>mere knowledge</u> of a subject."²

- God's Questions and Answers: ¹⁴ What use [benefit, profit, advantage] is it, my brethren, if a man [τις someone, anyone³] says he has faith, but does not [μη] have works? Is [not, μη] that faith able to save him? //
 - a. <u>The situation</u>: Someone says he has faith thus faith in Christ, but he has no works thus no evidence of his faith; can that faith save him? We could just guess as to whether or not such faith can save, but James has actually given us the answer in the Greek text.
 - b. <u>The answer</u>: Twice in James 2:14 we have the Greek word " $\mu\dot{\eta}$ " an interrogative particle which is used when a *negative answer* is expected. So, again, the situation: Someone *says* he has faith, *but he has no works*:
 - i. Is such faith useful? No!
 - ii. Can such faith save? No! The LSB notes:
 "Mere intellectual assent is not saving faith, nor does it produce fruit in response to God's gifts."⁴

³ Greek: τις – someone, a certain one, anyone; James uses that Greek word 12 times (1:5, 23, 26; <u>2:14</u>, 16, 18; 3:2, 13; 4:12; 5:13, 14, 19) to identify a person in need of repentance. In this section it's the one who says he has faith, but has no works! ⁴ Engelbrecht, 2137.

- 2. A Real-Life Example: If a brother or sister is without clothing [lit. bare, naked, uncovered] and in need [lit. lacking] of daily food, ¹⁶ and one [τις someone, anyone] of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and be filled," but you do not [μή] give them the necessities of the body, what use is that? // Sometimes we are unsure if a person is really needy or not, but here it is obvious: The person is naked or without the minimal amount of food needed for a single day.
 - a. <u>The answer</u>: Try to imagine yourself with no clothes and no food; then someone, *after seeing your needs*, says to you: "Go in peace, be warmed and be filled!" Would you feel better? Would such kind words be helpful in any manner? *Not at all!*
 - b. <u>The reality</u>: "Mere lip service or empty, pious blessings accomplish nothing for those in need, nor do they reflect faith."⁵ For all such people, who speak of faith but have no works, God is calling them to see His truth and repent!
- 3. The Shocking Reality: Even so faith, if it has no works, is dead, being by itself. // As a body without breath is dead, so faith without works is dead! John wrote: "...if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? (1Jo 3:17 ESV) The answer is: It doesn't!

Conclusion: <u>Works</u> *do not save*! <u>Faith + works</u> *do not save*! Instead, <u>faith alone in Jesus</u> *saves*! Then, from such faith will flow good works. The works never save, *but they reveal the saving faith*!

Let's remember and apply God's Word:

- 1. What is more important?
 - a. What we believe to be true.
 - b. What God says in His Word is true.
- 2. As breathing is vital for all who are alive; so _ are vital for all who are Christians!
- 3. How are people saved?
 - a. Thru their good works.
 - b. Thru their faith in Jesus + their good works.
 - c. Thru their faith in Jesus.
- 4. As a healthy fruit tree has fruit, so healthy Christians have _____!

Let us pray together: Dear LORD, You have saved us through Jesus! Now, in response, may our daily lives show forth the fact that we are Your forgiven children! Amen!
