Matthew 4:1-11 NIV

The Champion and His Method!

Sunday, March 9 at 8:00 & 10:45 First Sunday in Lent – 2014

Wednesday Services at 11 & 7; Meals at 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: God's sinless world became polluted with sin: The first Adam *was tempted by the devil and *fell into sin (Gen. 3:1-7; Rev. 12:9). Then, going ahead in time approximately 2,600 years, we come to the time of Moses. The LORD's plan was to use Moses to lead the Israelites *from their Egyptian bondage *to the Promised Land, BUT they *were tempted, *fell and *kept falling!

The *first* Adam did not stand, neither did the *chosen* Moses; therefore, in the fullness of time, *the Father sent His only Son to be the Champion*! Today, let us →see how the devil attacked Jesus, →understand the power of God's Holy Word, →trust in Jesus as our Champion, and →use Jesus' method in our daily Christian lives!

- 1. Jesus' Circumstances: ¹ Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil. ² After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. //
 - a. <u>How did Jesus get into this situation of being</u> <u>isolated and tempted</u>? Did He make some poor decisions; was He influenced by our sinful world? No! *He was led by the Holy Spirit!* For us our sinful nature is ever-trying to draw us away from

our Savior, but Jesus was led into His circumstances by the Holy Spirit!

b. <u>What about fasting</u>? We learned on Ash Wednesday (see the 3/5/14 sermon) that fasting in the Bible is almost always connected with fervent prayer. Jesus may have known strong temptations were coming, so He fasted – making Him physically weak but spiritually strong! The TDNT says that Jesus fasted "in order to be equipped to confirm his messianic dignity and power." (one volume, 633) If we choose to fast, let us always do so + in secret and + to bless our relationship with God!

2. Round One

- a. ³ The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread." // So the devil, → aware of Jesus' hunger and → wanting Jesus to provide for His own needs rather than trust in His Father, laid out his challenge. Even though Jesus IS the Son of God and COULD have turned the stones into bread, He did not fall to the devil's temptation. Instead, Jesus ◆showed trust in His Father and ◆exercised self-control!
- b. ⁴ Jesus answered, "It is written [in Deut. 8:3]: 'Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." // Moses originally spoke those words to the Israelites, reminding them of the LORD's faithful provision of manna during their 40 years in the

desert. All that we need ultimately comes from the mouth of the LORD – •salvation for our souls, •bread for our bodies, and •everything else! So let us **F**ully **R**ely **O**n **G**od (FROG)!

3. Round Two:

- a. ⁵ Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple.⁶ "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written [in Ps. 91:11-12]: 'He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone." // Here, as in the Garden of Eden (Gen. 3:1-7), the devil tried to twist the Word of God by leaving out this phrase: "To guard you in all your ways" (Ps. 91:11 NIV). Dr. Kretzmann wrote: "It is not in the ways of a man's own choosing that the protecting hand of God is assured him, but in the ways which agree with the rational order and the laws of the universe." (NT I:19) The devil basically said to Jesus: Just jump from here; God will send His angels, they will catch You, and everyone will follow You!
- b. ⁷ Jesus answered him, "It is also written [in Deut. 6:16]: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.''' // The devil had pulled God's Word out of context, which can be dangerous, so Jesus helped us understand Psalm 91 in a proper way by recalling a time when the Israelites wrongly put the LORD to a test.

- 4. Round Three:
 - a. ⁸ Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. ⁹ "All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me." // To some extent the devil had the world to give, but it's pleasures are limited to the here and now! The devil was enticing Jesus to take the easy way out, but Jesus saw the big picture both time and eternity. He knew that falling to the temptation would result in •His ultimate defeat and •our eternal punishment.
 - b. ¹⁰ Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written [in Deut. 6:13]: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'" // We are constantly tempted to desire the things of this sinful world, so let us remember what Jesus said: "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" (Mark 8:36 NAS)
- 5. Jesus' Victory: ¹¹ Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him. // Jesus was tempted, *BUT He did not fall!* With every temptation He used the Word of God to successfully defend Himself – showing Himself to be the Champion, *our Victorious Savior!*

Conclusion: Now, **†**sorry for our sins and **†**forgiven through Jesus, let us grow in *knowing* and *using* God's Holy Word! And all God's people said: *Amen!*
