## How to Look Forward...2019

**Introduction**: Dear friends in Christ: Here we are in the last hours of 2018; thinking back, *let us acknowledge some of God's blessings and give Him thanks*:

- + <u>We are still alive</u> thanks be to God!
- We have decent health thanks be to God!
- We have more than we need thanks be to God!
- Our sins are forgiven through Jesus thanks be to God!
- + God has a good plan for us in 2019 thanks be to God!

Now, \*knowing we have been blessed and \*rejoicing that our sins are forgiven, *let us be optimistic as we step into 2019!* 

Tonight we are in the Gospel of Luke; in chapter 12 Jesus taught on many topics. This is a brief summary: <u>JESUS SAID</u>:

- <u>Don't be a hypocrite</u>, pretending to be something you are not; instead, *let everyone see who you are!*
- Don't fear people; instead, fear God, who has the authority to cast people into hell!
- Don't be ashamed of Me; instead, acknowledge to others that you know Me!
- Don't love the riches of this world; instead, be rich in your relationship with God!

- Don't be anxious; instead, trust in the LORD to provide all that you need!
- Don't become complacent; instead, remain ever ready for My return!
- <u>Don't expect peace on earth</u>; instead, realize that I came to make a division between believers and nonbelievers!
- Don't focus on temporary things; instead, pay attention to eternal things!
- <u>Don't be stubborn</u>; instead, as it's better to settle with an earthly accuser – before going before a judge, so it's better to repent – before the final judgment!

Now, getting into Luke 13, Jesus was told of two tragic events in which multiple people died. The people presumed those who died must have been worse sinners – *because of how they died*, but Jesus said to them, "I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish" (v. 5 NAS).

Now, as we get into tonight's text in **Luke 13:6-9**, we continue with the topic of repentance:

- God Expected the People of Jerusalem to Repent:
  <sup>6</sup> And [Jesus] told this parable: "A man had a fig tree [Jerusalem] [having been] planted in his vineyard [Israel], and he came seeking fruit [repentance] on it and found none. // So Jesus told a simple story in order to make a spiritual point. The man is God, The fig tree is Jerusalem, The vineyard is the nation of Israel, and The fruit is repentance.
  - a. <u>What is repentance</u>? Here are two ways to define repentance according to Lenski (177-178):

- i. Repentance is "...that religious change of the heart which turns from sin and guilt to cleansing and forgiveness by God's grace."
- ii. Repentance "...looks both backward toward the regretted sin and forward toward the accepted pardon..."
- b. <u>What was God looking for in Jerusalem</u>? He wanted them to see their misplaced trust in *their works* for *their salvation*; then He wanted them to *trust in Jesus* as *their only Savior!*
- c. <u>How to look back on 2018</u>: Regarding all of our sins, let us regret them knowing *♦*they were not pleasing to God, and *♦*they were not good for us.
- d. How to look forward to 2019: Always with faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, *rejoicing that He received our sins and our punishment*; therefore, *through Him*, we are \*pardoned, \*forgiven, and \*washed clean in God's sight!
- 2. God's Grace has a Time Limit: <sup>7</sup> And he said to the vinedresser, 'Look, for three years now I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and I find none. Cut it down. Why should it use up the ground?'
  - a. <u>Regarding the three years of seeking fruit</u>: Those years refer to the time when John the Baptizer began his ministry until the time of our text. Now, thinking about the powerful ministries of John and Jesus, God expected many to repent; however, when Jesus came to His own people, most did not receive Him.
  - b. <u>Regarding the opportunity to repent</u>: The Bible says, "Seek the LORD while He may be found;

Call upon Him while He is near" (Isa. 55:6 NAS). Those words imply that someday those who seek the LORD will not find Him and, *though He is near now*, someday He will be very far away.

- 3. God Wants Everyone to be Saved: <sup>8</sup> And he answered him, 'Sir, let it alone this year also, until I dig around it and put on manure. <sup>9</sup> Then if it should bear fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'" // I challenge you to carefully *hear* and *think about* these key statements by Lenski (730-733):
  - a. "We should not erase the wrath by the mercy, nor lose sight of the mercy because of the wrath." The mercy is great; the wrath is horrible!
  - b. Jesus "uses every means of grace... [He] goes at his work hopefully... not halfheartedly, pessimistically, thinking that there is no use." So He really loves all, and wants all to be saved!
  - c. "It is a fact that judgment is often preceded by an intensification of grace." The grace is God's undeserved love; when it comes to unbelievers, may they never misinterpret it for salvation.
  - d. "...man may nullify every effort of [God's] liberating, saving power and willfully cast it from him for good..."

**Let Us Pray**: Dear Father, TYSM for making us sorry for our sins and giving us faith in Jesus; please grant us a 2019 that is good for us, honoring to You, and a blessing to others!

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
