Hebrews 12:4-24 ESV

CARE > God to Us... Us to Others!

Sunday, 8/25 – 9:00 + Monday, 8/26 – 7 PM

11th Sunday after Pentecost / 10th Sunday after Trinity – 2019

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: We are continuing a short series in Hebrews; we have already covered much of chapter 11 – with many amazing examples of faith. Today we pick up in chapter 12 with the important topic of discipline. Discipline is not pleasant for those receiving it, but the one giving it is \$showing care and \$putting his love into action!

- 1. Discipline Shows Care: ⁴ In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. ⁵ And have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons? "My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. // In 12:3, we were reminded that Jesus suffered much to fulfill His mission; as He did not give up, so we are being called to endure! Then, to help us understand our sufferings, let us *remember who we are God's children in Christ, and *rightly respond to His discipline. Why?
 - a. ⁶ For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises [literally scourges; severely punishes] every son whom he receives." ⁷ It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? // The word "discipline" does not sound pleasant, but it is used by God and parents to show love and care by *guiding, *instructing, *training, and *educating. For some, discipline must be very strong to be effective!

- b. 8 If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. 9 Besides this, we have had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? 10 For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. // Our parents did their best for us, even though it wasn't perfect; in response, we gave them some respect then, more respect now! What about with God our Father? His discipline to us "is without fail, always to our advantage; He never makes a mistake in the kind and in the amount of suffering which He has us endure" (Kretzmann, NT II: 489).
- ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it. 12 Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees. 13 and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed. // Think back to when you were being disciplined, did you enjoy it? By no means; however: "It is through that training of the Lord that our faith is rendered pure, true, precious, that we ourselves are thoroughly prepared, strengthened, founded unto eternal salvation" (Kretzmann, 489). Therefore, even when God's discipline is heavy upon us, let us rejoice that He is at work in our lives, be certain that He loves us, and know that He is at work for whatever is best spiritually and eternally!

- 2. Being at Peace with Others Shows Care: 14 Strive for peace with everyone, and for the holiness without which no one will see the Lord. // Having been forgiven in Christ, we \$forgive all who sin against us and \$try to be at peace with them. Also, knowing we must be holy in God's sight to have eternal life, we *are thankful to be in Christ now and *strive/struggle to live with ongoing sorrow and faith.
- 3. Paying Attention to Spiritual Needs Shows Care: 15 See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no "root of bitterness" springs up and causes trouble, and by it many become defiled; 16 that no one is sexually immoral or unholy like Esau, who sold his birthright for a single meal. ¹⁷ For you know that afterward, when he desired to inherit the blessing, he was rejected, for he found no chance to repent, though he sought it with tears. // The grace of God is salvation, so those who do not obtain grace **or** do not continue in it face damnation. We don't want that for us or anyone, so God is warning us to care about ourselves and others by noticing a TURN **♦from** God's Word **to** our own sinful ideas. Esau was mentioned as an example: *A single meal became more important to him than *being in the blood line of the Messiah. Later, he desired to gain the blessing back, yet he was rejected. Some lose blessings in this life; some lose God's gift of eternal life. Let us show that we care!

4. Contrasting Terror and Forgiveness Shows Care:

a. <u>Terror under the law</u>: These words describe the scene at Mt. Sinai when the Israelites received the Ten Commandments: ¹⁸ For you have not come to what may be touched, a blazing fire and darkness and gloom and a tempest ¹⁹ and the sound of a trumpet

and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that no further messages be spoken to them. ²⁰ For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even a beast touches the mountain, it shall be stoned." ²¹ Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear." // Without God's love in Christ, we should all be terrified! But, good news, God *loves us, *has saved us through Jesus' holy precious blood, and *has promised us the gift of a wonderful eternity!

b. Forgiveness under the gospel: These words identify God's dwelling place and those who are there with Him, including: Jesus, the holy angels, and those who died as believers in Jesus: 22 But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, 23 and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God, the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, ²⁴ and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel. // As the blood of Abel cried to God to take vengeance, so the blood of Jesus cries to God to pronounce us righteous by grace through faith! For those rejecting Christ, let us care about them by sharing God's law; for those who know Christ, let us comfort them with God's gospel!

This Week's Challenge: As the Lord cares about us by taking action according to our needs, so let us do the same toward others!

Let Us Pray: Dear Father in heaven, thank you for deeply caring for us; now move us to show true care for others!

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
