The Purification of Mary and the Presentation of Our Lord - 2020

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Today's topic is PEACE; when many hear that word, they may think of **the absence of war or **a state of calmness. How does the Bible use the word PEACE?

- ✓ A greeting: "Shalom" (Hebrew); on Easter Sunday Jesus appeared and said, "Peace to you!" (Lk 24:36 ESV).
- ✓ <u>Freedom from anxiety</u>: Paul wrote, "...let your requests be made known to God. And the **peace** of God... shall guard your hearts and your minds..." (Phil. 4:6-7 NAS).
- ✓ <u>Agreement between people</u>: Moses said to the people, "When you draw near to a city to fight against it, offer terms of **peace** to it" (Deut. 20:10 ESV).
- ✓ <u>Reconciliation with God</u>: Paul wrote, "...since we have been justified by faith, we have **peace** with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1 ESV).

The final meaning, *reconciliation with God*, is our focus today – on this special feast regarding Mary's purification and Jesus' presentation, *which is only celebrated when February 2 falls on a Sunday*. First, we will consider the Bible account of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus at the temple when Jesus was 40 days old; second, we will focus on three questions related to the topic of peace.

- Jesus' Amazing Day at the Temple When He Was 40 Days
 Old: Let's go to Luke chapter 2...
 - a. Purification and Presentation: ²² And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they [Joseph & Mary] brought him [Jesus] up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." // Since Luke mentioned purification and presentation, let's sort them out:
 - i. <u>Purification</u>: According to the Law given by God to Moses, purification was required for a woman 40 days after she gave birth to a son. The normal sacrifice was a lamb; Mary gave the sacrifice of someone who is poor: two turtledoves or two young pigeons (since the wise men had not yet visited); see Leviticus 12 for all the details!
 - ii. Presentation: Again, according to the Law given by God to Moses, all firstborn children belonged to the LORD and were to be redeemed bought back after they were at least a month old. Therefore, after Mary's 40 days of waiting, Joseph, Mary, and Jesus traveled the short distance of 6 miles from Bethlehem to Jerusalem. Mary was purified with the sacrifice noted above; Jesus was presented, and then redeemed with a payment of 5 shekels of silver, as God had instructed; see Exodus 13:1-16 and Numbers 18:15-16 for all the details!

- b. Simeon had been chosen: 25 Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous [trusting in the Promised Messiah] and devout [carefully observing God's laws], waiting for the consolation [comfort] of Israel [to be accomplished by the Messiah], and the Holy Spirit was upon him. 26 And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. // Think about this: The Messiah had been promised 4,000 years earlier so a long time had passed, yet the Holy Spirit told Simeon that he would actually SEE THE CHRIST before he died! So he was waiting and excited!!!
- c. Simeon spoke about Jesus: ²⁷ And he [Simeon] came in the Spirit [thus, led by the Spirit] into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law [to present Him and to pay the silver], ²⁸ he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said, ²⁹ "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation ³¹ that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."
 - Those famous words: You know them as the words to the liturgical hymn, the *Nunc Dimittis*, which is Latin for *Now You Dismiss*.
 - ii. <u>The meaning</u>: Simeon had God-given faith in the Promised Messiah. However, upon actually SEEING and HOLDING Jesus, *♦ he was even more sure of God's forgiveness*, *♦ he confessed that Jesus came*

- for everyone, and he was ready to be dismissed in peace from his earthly life!
- iii. <u>Dr. Luther regarding peace through Jesus</u>:

 "Whosoever has this Savior... may have a peaceful,
 quiet heart. For though death be as terrible, the sin
 as mighty, the devil as evil..., **yet** we have the Savior
 of God, that is, an almighty, eternal Savior; He is
 strong enough to move us out of death into life, out
 of sin into righteousness" (Kretzmann).
- 2. Peace: Thus reconciliation with God!
 - a. What is **peace**? It is being in a relationship with God, so that He is our heavenly Father and we are His holy children!
 - b. Why is **peace** important? That relationship of peace is essential for us to have God's gifts of forgiveness, spiritual life, and eternal salvation!
 - c. <u>How do we get **peace**</u>? God gives the gift of faith to trust in Jesus; God does that work by the Spirit through baptism, absolution, and the Bible!

This Week's Challenge: Imagine your life without God's peace; then give thanks to God for the peace He has given to you through Jesus!
