

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Today's text is a valuable lesson on how we – as ones who know Jesus – should live and speak among people who do not yet know Jesus. May the Holy Spirit help us to learn what Paul did and said, and then help us to do similar things in our lives!

Today we are in Acts 17. Prior to our text, Paul, Silas, and Timothy proclaimed Christ in Greece; however, because of persecution, *they all left Thessalonica, *then, because of more persecution, Paul left Berea to go to Athens. We now continue with Paul, by himself, in Athens Greece...

1. Paul Put His Care for Others into Action: ¹⁶ Now while Paul was waiting for them [Silas and Timothy] at Athens, his spirit was provoked [upset] within him as he saw that the city was full of idols. ¹⁷ So he reasoned [spoke for the purpose of convincing] in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons [the God-fearing Gentiles], and in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. // What did Paul see in Athens? Lenski wrote this description: "Sculpture, Greek architecture, Greek theaters, schools of [thinking], [well-educated people] of all kinds, all steeped in Greek [non-Christian religions]" (707-708). Those are the things that upset Paul, *but he didn't get angry*; instead, he reasoned with them about Jesus! Let us do the same with the people we meet!

- 2. Paul Was Given a Greater Opportunity: ¹⁸ Some of the Epicurean and Stoic philosophers [that is, the professional philosophers (followers of Epicurus, 340-272 BC, and Zeno, 336-260 BC, who taught at the Stoa – meaning Porch, thus called Stoics)] also conversed with him. And some said, "What does this babbler wish to say?" Others said, "He seems to be a preacher of foreign divinities"-- because he was preaching Jesus and the resurrection. ¹⁹ And they took him and brought him to the Areopagus [a.k.a. Mars Hill, the meeting place of the council in ancient Athens], saying, "May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? 20 For you bring some strange things to our ears. We wish to know therefore what these things mean." ²¹ Now all the Athenians and the foreigners who lived there would spend their time in nothing except telling or hearing something new. // Take note of the progression: (1) Paul began in the marketplace among the common people, (2) then the professional philosophers got involved, and (3) then Paul was brought to their official meeting location. They were not persecuting Paul; instead, they genuinely wanted to hear him speak!
- 3. Paul Preached an Amazing Sermon: ²² So Paul, standing in the midst of the Areopagus, said:
 - a. <u>Paul met the people where they were</u>: "Men of Athens, I perceive that in every way you are very religious [devout, committed to various gods].²³ For as I

passed along and observed the objects of your worship, I found also an altar with this inscription: 'To the unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. // Paul's hearers were interested in learning, so, when Paul began to speak, he drew them close to him by giving them a compliment, "...in every way you are very religious." When we speak to others, (1) let us get to know them, then (2) let us began where they are with God's truth!

b. Paul began with creation: ²⁴ The God who made the world and everything in it, being Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in temples made by man, ²⁵ nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mankind life and breath and everything.²⁶ And he made from one man every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth, having determined allotted periods and the boundaries of their dwelling place, ²⁷ that they should seek God, and perhaps feel their way toward him and find him. Yet he is actually not far from each one of us, ²⁸ for "In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, "For we are indeed his offspring.' // When Paul and others spoke to Jews, the Jews already knew about ♦the true God, ♦His work of creation, ♦the reality of sin, and ♦the Promised Messiah. Therefore, for Jewish audiences, the focus was on proclaiming Jesus as the risen Christ! However, the Gentiles did NOT possess that basic knowledge **AND** neither do most people today. Therefore, Paul's message at Athens is a good message for us to use with others in the world today! In other words, I get to know someone, then I continue

with God as Creator, then help them to know their very existence is from God, and then explain that they are part of God's grand plan for all mankind!

- c. Paul continued with a call to repent: ²⁹ Being then God's offspring, we ought not to think that the divine being is like gold or silver or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of man [God is FAR GREATER than all such things]. ³⁰ The times of ignorance [when you lacked the knowledge of God] God overlooked, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹ because he has fixed a day on which he will judge the world in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed [that is, JESUS]; and of this [God] has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."
 - i. <u>Today, who is being called to repent</u>? "...**all people everywhere**," without no one being left out!
 - ii. <u>What did Paul mean by "repent"</u>? God was calling and empowering them (1) "to turn to the true God from their idols and their ignorance with an inward change of heart" (Lenski, 736) and (2) to trust in the man who is ♦risen from the dead, ♦appointed by God, and ♦coming to judge the world!

This Week's Challenge: As Paul *put his caring into action, *seized his God-given opportunities, and *met people where they were with God's Word, *so let us do those same things beginning today!*

Let Us Pray: Dear Holy Spirit, now that we have learned about Paul's work in Athens, <u>encourage</u> us, <u>empower</u> us, and <u>move</u> us to kindly *tell the truth* and *call people to repent!*

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
