

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: This is part 3 of the series, Anxious for Nothing.¹ Since almost everyone struggles with anxiety, I have some good news to share with you!

In part 1, we learned that God is SOVEREIGN — in control of all things! So, whenever *things seem out of control and *we are anxious, let us always trust in God who is fully in control!

In part 2, we learned *an important truth and *some specific actions. Truth: Why should we NOT be anxious? Because "the Lord is NEAR" (Phil. 4:5). What action should we take?

Give all our anxieties to God through SPECIFIC prayer!

Today, in part 3, we will *learn that a change is attitude is much more important than a change in circumstances and *see some great examples of trust in the face of calamity.

1. Great Gratitude:

a. <u>If only</u>: Think about your life..., are you **content** <u>OR</u> have you sometimes thought: My life would be *better* **if only** I was *****thinner, **or ***richer, **or ***(you fill in the

- blank)? If you answered yes, you may be *anxious about what you DO NOT have while, at the same time, *forgetting about what you DO have. What is the remedy? The Bible gives us two vital words of instruction in Philippians chapter 4:
- i. Our anxieties give them to God: How? Identify each source of anxiety; then, through prayer, make a specific, detailed request of God to resolve the reason for which you are anxious.
- ii. Our thanksgiving express it to God: Even when we are anxious, we have reasons to give thanks, so >think, >identify, and >give hearty thanks to God!
- b. Being content: When does that blessed reality begin?
 "...not when circumstances change, but when our attitude toward them does" (93). So, let us do this:
 *acknowledge God's sovereignty, *realize God has a plan, and *fill our minds with God's blessings!
- c. Paul's HUGE STATEMENT about being content: "...I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am [— whether I have a little or a lot]. ...in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret of being [content]... I can do all things through [Christ] who strengthens me" (Phil. 4:11-13). Paul learned "a secret," something unknown to most people. What secret?
 - i. Most people: Their happiness depends on temporal things, for example, *physical health, *size of home, *kind of car, *money in the bank, *etc. Sometimes they are happy, sometimes they are sad, and the cycle keeps repeating itself again and again.
 - ii. **Paul**: His happiness was *CONSISTENT* because it depended on **having Christ**! This is a critical point:

our contentment is connected to WHAT WE DESIRE! For Paul, his desire was ONLY CHRIST, so he was ALWAYS CONTENT! What or who is your desire?

- 2. God's Peace, Your Peace: Forgiveness thru Jesus & more!
 - a. A perfect storm:
 - i. What does that mean? Try to recall the movie, based on the 1991 storm: Hurricane Grace moving north, combined with a massive low-pressure system moving south; together, they produced \$40to-80-foot waves, \$\infty\$ widespread coastal damage, and \$\infty\$ a second hurricane!
 - ii. What about our perfect storms? Maybe excessive credit card debt PLUS a layoff, or maybe a health crisis PLUS a struggling relationship. When things PILE UP, what should we do? ▶Remember: The Lord is near..... [▶Use specific prayer to give our anxieties and our thanksgivings to God.] And [▶bask in] the peace of God, [which] will guard [our] hearts and [our] minds in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:5-7).
 - b. Paul's perfect storm: As recorded in Acts 27, *Paul was a prisoner, *he was on a ship going to Rome, and *it was late in the sailing season. When they reached Fair Havens, Paul said they should winter there, but the others chose to continue to the port of Phoenix. As they sailed, they found themselves in a perfect, non-stop storm for 14 days! Then, when all hope for survival was gone, *Paul spoke up again, *they listened, and *God brought all of them to land safely.

What lessons should we learn:

i. <u>Consequences</u>: They did NOT listen, so the boat and cargo were lost. <u>Are WE in a storm NOW because</u>

we did NOT listen to God (Rev. 3:19)? For example,

- having ungodly friends = *trouble* (Prov. 13:20);
- robbing from God = *financial struggles* (Mal. 3:8-9); and rother dependent of the struggles (Mal. 3:8-9).
- ii. Remedy: "If we confess our sins..." (1 John 1:9).
- iii. <u>God's help</u>: He sends angels to serve those who will inherit salvation (Heb. 1:14); on the ship, an angel gave Paul instruction and encouragement (Ac. 23-24).
- iv. God's deliverance: "Many are the..." (Ps. 34:19).
- v. <u>Trust in God</u>: Jehoshaphat (the fourth king of Judah and one of only 5 good kings) found himself in a perfect storm when the Moabites combined with two other nations against Judah. <u>What did he do?</u> He *called for the whole nation to fast and *prayed this to the LORD, "...we are powerless before this great multitude... but our eyes are on You" (2 Chr. 20:12). Then the LORD answered, "Do not fear... because of this great multitude, for the battle is not yours but [Mine]" (15). In response, Jehoshaphat put singers, praising the LORD, out in front of his army. Then, by the time they reached the battle, *their enemies had turned on themselves and *the battle was over!

Conclusion: Jesus' work has opened our way to God.

- Truth The secret of being content: Desire Jesus the most!
- Relevance The LORD will carry us through every storm!
- Inspiration Confession and trust result in God's peace!
